County councillor's monthly report for March 2020

For the Histon and Impington (H&I) county council division of Cambridgeshire which also includes King's Meadow and Orchard Park.

It's clearly been a funny month with no meetings (except for a virtual one at the Combined Authority) after the middle of the month when all meetings including a Full Council meeting were cancelled.

Note that the Council is at the centre of the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Strategic Coordinating Group (SCG) which brings together all public sector bodies to coordinate the public sector response to the Covid-19 situation.

Full Council meeting

The advertised Full Council meeting was cancelled.

Committee meetings and other council matters

<u>Adults</u>: there was one key decision viz to approve the business case for Cambridgeshire's Technology Enabled Care Service to become a Lifeline provider that includes a tender for an Alarm Receiving Centre for a four-year contract.

Children & Young People: this committee met but there were no key decisions.

<u>Communities & Partnerships</u>: this committee met (doesn't it always?) but there were no key decisions (are there ever?).

<u>Economy & Environment:</u> there were two key decision. The first related to the allocation of Integrated Transport Block funds. This is a small pot, the big money is now with the Combined Authority. The second decision was more significant and the committee agreed to renew the bikeability contract. This has been close to death in recent years and it's good to see that its funding now seems secure.

<u>Highways & Infrastructure</u> met. There were no key decisions but it did agree the winners (and losers) in the annual Local Highways Improvements scheme. Histon & Impington was successful (again) but Orchard Park sadly missed the cut.

Commercial & Investment, General Purposes, Health: these committees did not meet.

The <u>Planning</u> committee did not meet. It has not met since Oct 19 and its next meeting has been further pushed back to May 20.

Neither the <u>Greater Cambridge Partnership Executive</u> nor the <u>Assembly</u> met.

The <u>Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority</u> met virtually. Because such meetings do not yet have permission to take decisions it was therefore an exercise in watching the Mayor take them himself. The meeting took place on Zoom and seems to have worked well. Its <u>Transport & Infrastructure</u>, <u>Housing & Communities</u> and <u>Skills</u> Committees and its <u>Business Board</u> also met.

The <u>Cambridgeshire Police & Crime Panel</u> did not meet. Its end March meeting was cancelled and it has not yet set a next date to meet.

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The <u>Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Fire Authority</u> met virtually to determine its decision on going ahead with the non-Police land version of the new fire HQ.

The <u>Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Health & Wellbeing Board</u> met. This committee makes few decisions and the meeting was typical. inter alia it received an update on the joint Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Health & Wellbeing Strategy consultation and 'think communities' approach.
